The binding of the scrapbook is in fair condition. While the binding staples are intact, the front and back covers are separating from the rest of the scrapbook.

Biographical Note

Dr. Grace Patten Conant was the head of the English Department at Millikin University from 1906-1926. She founded Millikin's first English Club in 1920 (renamed the Conant Society in 1927) for students with an interest in English literature. Conant was born in 1874 in Littleton, Massachusetts and held degrees from Bates College and Cornell University. In addition to Millikin, Conant also taught at Cornell, the University of Chicago, Goucher College in Baltimore, Maryland, and Western College in Oxford, Ohio. Dr. Conant's first endowment to Millikin University was \$1,000 for the issuance of a yearly award given to the English major who has the highest grade point average for seven semesters. In 1962, Conant provided another endowment of \$5,000 to provide for two annual achievement awards in English literature. She also founded the Decatur chapter of the American Association of University Women (AAUW). Conant died on March 15, 1965 at 92 years old.
